

The most prolific worker categories








SEASONAL WORK INCENTIVES TRIAL

In 2017 the Australian Government has introduced a two-year Seasonal Work Incentives Trial to help domestic unemployed workers as well as meet the labour needs in the horticultural industry.

Australia's horticulture sector at a glance

- Geographic location matters
- Over-reliance on WHMs (initial purpose: cultural exchange)
- Slow uptake of the SWP (main intend: foreign development program)
- Mass production, economies of scale and the disappearance of small family run farms
- Duopoly of Woolworths and Coles causing a price manipulation
- > Vulnerability of the workforce
- ➤ Low level of trade union oversight
- ➤ Intermediaries such as labour-hour companies exacerbate the risk of worker exploitation



Do farms experience labour shortages? A narrative of the conventional arguments

- demographic
 - rural depopulation and ageing population
 - · exodus of youth
 - Low incentive for domestic workers
- expanding production and intensification of competition
 - decline of the family farm
 - exercise of market power beyond the farm gate
 - increasing farm size
- Corporatisation of agricultural industry
 - increasing production
 - export focus
 - Economies of scale

Contradictory government responses

Enhancing the liberalisation of international-based labour force formation

- extending employment opportunities for WHMs and SWPs
 - o age range expanded
 - duration of employment extended
- expanding the number of WHM and W&H source countries
 - o boosted by free trade/labour mobility agreements with China and Indonesia
- abolishing 457 visas and replacing with more restrictive 482 visas
- establishing migration agreements that permit sponsored 482 visa recruitment for skilled and semi-skilled occupations
 - Designated Area Migration Agreements; Dairy/Meat Industry Labour Agreements negotiated via the Department of Immigration and Border Protection

Lagged development of reciprocal policy protection measures

No evidence of Home Affairs auditing Agreements
